

A Conversation with Lauren Child about Her Picture Book

The story was inspired by my friend Verity, who used to have a little Burmese cat. Verity was always wanting to dress the cat in little bonnets and jewelry, and I couldn't help wondering how the cat might feel about this – she didn't look like the clothes-wearing type. I had already written a book called *That Pesky Rat*, about a neglected street rat who has nothing, and I thought it would be interesting to write about a pampered poodle who has everything. However, all the poodle really wants is to catch sticks and splash in puddles like real dogs do.

Do you have any dogs or other pets (or have you ever)? Did they affect the story in any way?

No, I have no pets. When I was a child, we had sixteen guinea pigs, a rabbit, a tortoise, three hamsters, various goldfish, and many stick insects. As much as I love animals, this experience may have cured me of my need to own a pet.

Besides being a very funny and fetching story, there seems to be an underlying message in Who Wants to Be a Poodle I Don't about being true to yourself. Did you know from the start that that lesson would be a part of the book, or did it evolve as you worked on it?

No, I never really write a book with a moral or message in mind, I just write about something that means something to me. A theme or idea begins to evolve as I write and illustrate the story. I am happy for people to read things into what I have written, because this is one of the wonderful things about books: they mean something different to every reader. For *me*, this book is about how sometimes we don't truly listen to other people, and as a result we often have a hard time understanding them and what it is they need.
